Summer activities 2: Going to the park/ in the garden

We have created five handouts with suggestions for activities you can do <u>at home</u> during the summer holiday. These are:

- 1. Going on a picnic
- 2. Going to the park
- 3. Going to the seaside
- 4. Going to the zoo
- 5. Exploring food

Going to the park/ in the garden. Perhaps you can go to a local park near you to run around and explore. Here are some things you can also do at home, in the garden, on a balcony, etc.

Gather things from the park and put into separate containers to make a sensory container: sticks, leaves, cut grass, flowers, stones.

Make your own park or garden using a box, tray or large plate. Put some soil on the box, tray or plate and add stones, twigs, leaves, small flowers and anything else you have gathered.



On a balcony or a small outside space- make a mud play area








Place some soil (wet or dry) on a coloured tray and explore mark making using hands, fingers, and tools (such as a stick, paintbrush, etc.)



Use large chalks to make marks on the ground, You can also chalk tracks and roads for bikes, trikes and scooters.







- This can be a bowl/box/tray of soil
- Provide some old small containers (cups, saucepans, bowls, etc.), spoons, etc. for your child to explore stirring, filling containers, etc.
- Fill a plant pot with soil and stick the flowers in you have made (see art activities below)



Make some EDIBLE MUD (from The Imagination Tree)

- 2-3 packets of chocolate pudding mix (Angel Delight or similar)
- Milk or water

Mix up the chocolate pudding according to the packet with milk or water. You can also add in shredded wheat, porridge oats, raisings, etc. to give different textures. Use it to play with straight away before it sets



On a sunny day, use paintbrushes and water to make marks on the ground. Look at what happens to the marks as the sun dries them.





Make some paper flowers (using straws, barbeque sticks, lollipop sticks, twigs for stems) and paper, foil, etc. for the flowers.

Find a yogurt pot or toilet roll tube to decorate and use a a flower pot to put your flowers in and make your own garden





Draw outlines of flower pots onto a large piece of cardboard. Put holes in for your child to put flowers into, that they pick in the park or the garden







Find a branch to make a butterfly tree. Make different butterflies to hang on your tree.

Make a butterfly collage with different coloured paper





Make butterfly cakes (see recipe)



Grow some sunflowers from seed in the garden or a pot. How tall will they grow?





Make a sunflower collage



Make ice pops to take with you or to enjoy and cool down at home. You can also try freezing slices of fruit such as oranges and lemons to suck on when it is hot.


Go on a scavenger hunt in your local park, garden, balcony or collect these items and hide them around your home.

Leaf, flower petal, stick, blade of grass, stone.


You could also tick items off with your child using the sheet at the end of the handout.

Making individual butterfly cakes


Mix eggs with milk.

Put 1 tablespoon self-raising flour in a bowl.



Each child in their own bowl:


Then add 1 teaspoon margarine.

Then add 1 teaspoon sugar.




6. Mix the ingredients well.
