

When is a child ready for phonics sessions?

^{*}Some children may be sight readers and find a different approach to interpreting text more helpful than synthetic phonics. This handout covers whole word reading.

^{*}Some children will "read" words without understanding what they have read. Comprehension is essential for meaningful reading. Your Speech and Language Therapist will be able to advise you.
